She lived alone and struggled to put food on the table and a roof over their heads. She was also a repeated victim of domestic violence. She lived in a community of about 40,000 people. Within this town there were 43 Christian churches.

The shocking thing about all of this is that this young mother knew nothing about God and the Christian church. She wanted to know if any Christian church would "allow" her to attend. Her perception of the church was that you needed to be baptized and pay dues of 10% of your income to be a member. She had this perception because other unbelievers were quick to tell her their perception of Christianity. Unfortunately no Christians had ever spoken to her about the true facts concerning Christianity. As a result she had never been told about Jesus dying on the cross for the sins of world and Him rising again from the grave. She never heard of Moses, Abraham, David, Peter, or Paul. She could not name one apostle or book of the Bible.

The irony of all this is that she lived right across the street from a Christian church. People went there to worship, but she never was told she was "allowed" to enter through the redeeming blood of Jesus Christ.

This true story led me to turn back to the story of the first Easter and view it in a new light. Women had gone to the burial site of Jesus early the day after the Sabbath to anoint Jesus' dead body. They were in a sense making an offering to Jesus not yet knowing the great offering He had made for them. At the tomb they saw a young man dressed in a white robe who announced to them that they were not to be afraid. The body of Jesus was no longer there because He had risen from the dead just as He said He would. Then they were told to go back into town and tell the eleven disciples and all the others the message that Jesus had risen from the grave.

This led me to think about my Easter celebration and yours. It is good that we come to God's house on Easter bringing our gifts and being refreshed with the truth that we have living and reigning Savior Who has conquered sin, Satan, and death for us. But what about the people in our communities who are like the mother of two in our opening story? Are we going to let the unbelieving world fill those people with false and distorted concepts of Christianity, or are we going to do the Lord's bidding and "preach the Gospel to every creature?" We have been to Jesus' tomb spiritually and seen the truth of His resurrection and its meaning for all people. Let us not only be Easter worshippers, but Easter proclaimers of God's truth each and every day of our lives.

"Don't leave home without it." With this slogan, we are asked to put our trust in a small rectangular piece of plastic when we travel. By carrying this piece of plastic, a credit card, nothing that can go wrong can't be fixed. Trusting in this piece of plastic, we have peace of mind. We can have a relaxed and enjoyable trip. There is nothing to worry about. The credit card allows us to take care of all our needs.

Jesus sent out His disciples to travel through the land and proclaim the good news that God's promise had been fulfilled in Him, for He, the Messiah, had come. Calling the Twelve to him, he sent them out two by two and gave them authority over evil spirits. These were his instructions: "Take nothing for the journey except a staff—no bread, no bag, no money in your belts. Wear sandals but not an extra tunic."

Jesus sent His disciples out with nothing more than the power of His Word. In their infant faith, they had to put their complete trust in their Lord and master. In faith, they had to trust that their needs would be provided for, that they would have peace of mind, and that they would be protected from danger as they preached and taught the Word.

There is much to take to heart in this account. First, Jesus constantly draws us, His disciples, further into an intimate relationship of service to Him by the work of the Holy Spirit through the Word. He employs us to serve Him as an extension of His mission of saving grace. He uses us to proclaim the Gospel message. He uses us to bring those around us to Him. Just as His disciples did, in faith, we trust that He has given us everything we need to proclaim Him as the Savior, the Christ, who died for the sins of all.

Secondly, those who heard the disciples preach were empowered to aid and support their ministry. You see, according to Mark chapter 6, the disciples set out to serve the Lord with nothing more than the clothes on their backs. As they preached and taught the Word, people were moved and opened their homes to them, giving of their wealth and possessions to meet the needs of the disciples.

As you celebrate Easter, please make every effort to be in worship at St. Paul's. As you attend to celebrate Christ's victory over sin and death, please consider a special "thank offering" to the Lord's work in our community. *Yours in Him, Board of Stewardship.*

March Devotion: "Covering For Shame"

And when they had crucified Him, they divided His garments among them by casting lots. (Matthew 27:35) Read John 19:23-24

Most of us know shame. Shame for something we've done long ago, something almost forgotten until a chance word reminds us, and we cringe. Shame for something that was done to us, that we know was not our fault, but we can't shake the memory. Shame for something we can't help and we can't change, that maybe shouldn't even be shameful at all, but it still causes that kind of pain.

When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took His clothes away. Almost every painting and crucifix in the world shows Jesus wearing a loincloth, but that's more a reflection of what we hope happened rather than what really did happen. The Romans normally crucified people naked. Shame was part of the punishment.

And this, too, Jesus bore for us. He came to be with us, within our pain and shame, to take it from us and onto Himself. He took our shame to give us His honor -- His comfort -- His glory. He died naked, in order to clothe us in His forgiving love.

There is no shame so deep that Jesus has not taken it upon Himself. And in exchange He gives us -- Himself. Our Savior, our Lord, our healer. "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ" (Galatians 3:27). When God looks at us, He sees His beloved children -- safe in Christ Jesus.

THE PRAYER: Thank You for covering my shame, Lord Jesus. Set my heart upon You to love You through everything I do. Amen.

Reflection Questions:

What is something very minor that happened to you and caused you embarrassment?

Have you ever comforted another person who felt shame? How did you do it?

Christ has taken our shame and given us His own dignity and freedom. In God's eyes (the only eyes that matter) you are His beloved child. Describe your thoughts and feelings about this.
