Many who have adhered to the President's guidelines and the governors' orders seem to becoming impatient as time goes on. People want to return to a normal way of life once again.

As I reflected on our present situation, I considered what event Scripture might parallel our present situation. Immediately the historical account of Noah and the flood came to my mind.

In Genesis chapter 6, verses 11 and following, we see that the world had become corrupt and the Lord was tired of it. God told Noah: "Make yourself an ark" (verse 14). "I am going to bring floodwaters on the earth to destroy all life under the heavens, every creature that has the breathe of life in it" (verses 17). The Lord called Noah to bring into the ark his wife, his three sons and their wives, along with a male and female of every living creature.

Now comes the astonishing point. After Noah built the ark according to God's specifications and brought into the ark all everything God had commanded ordered, he closed the ark up and it rained for 40 days and 40 nights. Remember the floodwaters of two years ago. What Noah experienced far exceeded any floods with which we have ever had to deal. In fact, verses 19 and 20 of Genesis chapter 7 tell us that the waters "rose greatly on the earth, and all the high mountains were covered... to a depth of more than twenty feet."

Forty days confined in an ark with continual rain. Does it sound like anything we know today? Well the account does not end here. While there was no more rain after forty days, the waters did not subside so that Noah and his family could get out of the ark. In all Noah and his family were confined in the ark for one year and 10 days (compare Genesis 7:11 and Genesis 8:14). We think we have been in for a long ride, but it is nothing to what Noah encountered.

How was it that Noah built a huge ark on dry land and then rode out the storm for so long? In Hebrews chapter 11, verse 7, we are told that Noah believed in all God told him. This is why Noah built the ark according to God's design and did so when the concept of a flood was foreign to man's experiences. Noah also trusted that one day God would cause the flood waters to recede and his life on earth would be able to return to normal.

It is this faith in God that you and I are to have in the midst of the coronavirus. As the Lord watches over the needs of a sparrow, we can know that He is watching over us too. Jesus told us in Luke 12:6-7: "Are not five sparrows sold for two pennies? Yet not one of them is forgotten by God.... Don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows." The truth of this can be seen in that Jesus died for our sins on Calvary and rose from the dead to give us eternal life in heaven.

How then shall we live these days and the days that are to come? In worship to our Lord. Noah never forgot God's promises of deliverance while on the ark, and as soon as he stepped foot on dry land he built an altar to the Lord (Genesis 8:20). The Psalmist calls us to worship: "Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker; for He is our God and we are the people of His pasture, the flock under His care" (Psalm 95:6-7).

Learning from God through Life's Experiences

I suspect that God has taught each one of us lessons as we have gone through various situations and circumstances in our lives. I know that is true for me. I learned lessons from God when my car failed to start; when my son was in serious automobile accident; when I had surgery on a torn meniscus; and when Jeri had brain cancer and died.

Every situation we go through in life, God is seeking to make the truth of His word come alive in our lives. Proverbs 4:11 finds God telling us: "I guide you in the way of wisdom and lead you along straight paths." In Deuteronomy 4:9 God tells us: "Only be careful, and watch yourselves closely so that you do not forget the things your eyes have seen or let them slip from your heart as long as you live. Teach them to your children and to their children after them."

What things have you learned from God in the present coronavirus epidemic through which God has been taking you? You may think that what you have learned is not that significant or of importance to other people. Yet, as the above passages indicate, God wants us to learn and to share with others His work in our lives. We can rest assured that as we share God's workings the Holy Spirit will use our Christian testimony to touch the lives of other people.

To this end I have a request to make of all of you. I would like to hear from you by letter, email, or a telephone call to find out what God has been teaching you through this pandemic. Would you please share with me what you have been learning from God, and I will use next month's epistle article to share with you things that God has been teaching me. May we use this crisis to let God's guiding hand shine through us as we share how He is blessing us even in the most difficult of times. God bless, Pastor Rohde

From the Board of Lay Ministry

The Covid 19 virus has caused many changes in our lifestyles that have made us pause and reflect on how we can adapt or change to keep moving forward or at least not fall back. In Indiana, we are still under a "stay at home" directive from Governor Holcomb until at least May 1st and our gathering for worship services are temporarily suspended, but there ARE opportunities to hear God's word presented in worship service settings:

- 1. We continue to monitor what our civil authorities (state Governor Holcomb and President Trump) issue on a daily basis to see how we can respond in our activities and corporate worship. We truly hope that we can resume our worshipping together soon, but while gathering together is suspended, please continue to worship through on-line services, daily devotions, Bible study and prayer. Please continue to support St Paul's through your offerings..even though we don't gather together for worship services, there are still staff salaries, utility bills, insurance and operational expenses that must be paid. Praise God for the gifts provided during this crisis and always!

The SCHOOL THEME for the 2019-2020 school year is <u>JOY:FULLY LUTHERAN</u>. It is based on I Thess. 5:16-24: "Be joyful always; pray continually..."

Dear Members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church,

He is Risen! He is Risen, Indeed! Hallelujah! Pastor Rohde's Easter sermon, "Done Deal," needs to be applied to all parts of our lives including school. In and through all things God is in control, and He is our strength and comfort. Let me share with you (3) very important details about how we are continuing the ministry of Christian Education here at St. Paul's during this time of social distancing.

- 1. Did you know that at the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year our school bought 30 chromebook computers? Looking back, this was perfect timing for this change here at school. Not only did our 6-8th grade use these computers on a daily basis through the first three quarters of the school year, they now are a major component of our continuous learning plan here at St. Paul's.
- 2. Did you know that through the hard work of Miss Rennecker and Mr. Otto our school was approved for the Google Suite for every student? This Suite (or collection of Google Based Programs), is now providing teachers with the ability to communicate with students on a daily basis and it is being used to continue class discussions even from home! It also gives students and teachers access to a host of programs similar to Microsoft Office free of charge. This is truly a blessing to our continuous learning plan for the remainder of this school year.
- 3. Did you know that we were able to send at least (1) chromebook home with each school family on Friday, March 13th (our last day of "old fashioned" school) so that we could guarantee that every student would be able to continue their education from home? God truly is in charge, and He is continuing to provide for our school and our ministry here at St. Paul's.

While nothing will replace in person teacher to student instruction and interaction, *continuous education* is the definition that we use to explain what we are doing during these uncertain times. God has continued to allow staff the ability to teach math, language arts, science, social studies, and other subjects through the use of technology, and printed materials. To God be the Glory!

We as staff, are also reminded of the great school families and church members that we have at St. Paul's. School families are now logging into their Google classroom from home to check for posted assignments, or logging on to Google Meet for their classes daily. Thank you parents for your patience and support during this transition, and thank you church members for your continued prayers and support of our school ministry here at St. Paul's.

I will finish with part of a staff devotion that we had right before Easter. The title of the Devotion was "Uncertain Times." "So this morning, I'm taking a deep, noncontrolling breath and saying to Jesus, "You are right, I am Yours. Do Your thing. I will trust You." Even when I don't have a clue about what is coming around the next corner. Because according to the One Who established the earth....He's got this too."

May Devotion: "Delivered From Death"

Psalm 116:3-4 - The snares of death encompassed me; the pangs of Sheol laid hold on me; I suffered distress and anguish. Then I called on the Name of the LORD: "O LORD, I pray, deliver my soul!"

"And when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives" (Matthew 26:30). On the night He was betrayed, Jesus and His disciples finished their Passover meal and sang a hymn before they continued on to Gethsemane. The hymn may have been part of the Hallel, Psalms 113 to 118, sung during the Passover celebration. So perhaps, on the night before He was crucified, Jesus sang these prophetic words, "The snares of death encompassed Me, the pangs of Sheol laid hold on Me; I suffered distress and anguish."

Tangled in the snares of approaching death, with Sheol, the place of the dead, awaiting Him, Jesus suffered distress and anguish. He said to His disciples, "My soul is very sorrowful even to death" (Matthew 26:38b). With His sweat falling to the ground like great drops of blood, Jesus cried out in prayer to His Father. He called on God to deliver Him, asking that the cup of suffering might pass from Him, the terrible cup of God's wrath against human sin. Yet, obedient to His Father, Jesus also prayed, "Nevertheless, not as I will, but as You will" (Matthew 26:39b).

Jesus' prayer was answered according to the Father's will. The hour had come. Jesus' betrayer arrived, and the Savior was handed over into the hands of His enemies. The next morning, on the day we call Good Friday, Jesus was nailed to the cross. Bearing our sins in His own body, He drained to the end the cup of suffering, the cup of God's anger and judgment. The Son of God suffered the penalty of death to save us.

The psalm Jesus had sung just a few hours earlier held words of anguish; it also foretold what would follow the terrible suffering of the cross. Before His crucifixion, Jesus sang out these words of trust and hope: "You have delivered My soul from death, My eyes from tears, My feet from stumbling; I will walk before the LORD in the land

of the living" (Psalm 116:8-9). On the first Easter morning, the Son of God was delivered from death and the grave—and through faith in His Name, we are delivered from the snares of sin and death, too.

When we suffer distress and anguish, struggling against fear, pandemic, death, and loss, the prayer of the psalm is our prayer and its words of hope are ours: "O LORD, I pray, deliver my soul!" God hears our prayers and, according to His will and perfect timing, He will deliver us. When our crucified and risen Savior returns in glory, we will be raised from death and the grave, as He was raised. On that great day, we will walk forever in the land of the living and our living Lord will walk with us!

THE PRAYER: Mighty risen Lord, You suffered in distress and anguish to deliver us from sin and death. Walk with us now when we are in distress and deliver us according to Your gracious will. We look forward to the day when we will walk with You in glory. Amen.
