From the desk of Pastor Rohde:

I told you last month that in the June Epistle I would share with you some things I have learned through the coronavirus. I will begin by sharing with you my strong belief from God's Word that everything happens for a purpose and that every experience a Christian encounters is meant to bring about something positive with regard to the Christian faith and life. James, a servant of God, wrote to Christians under the Holy Spirit's power: "Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trails of many kinds, because you know that the testing of your faith develops perseverance. Perseverance must finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything." Each encounter a Christian goes through in life is meant to develop his character, strengthen his faith, and intensify his walk with Christ. So what may we have learned from a long April of being isolated?

The first thing God convicted me of is living one day at a time. As with all of you, my life is filled with many plans and scheduled events. During the pandemic we had planned vacations to North Carolina and eastern Tennessee. God kept us home. We have two family weddings in June and one in July. Our being a part of these events is in doubt. This can be a frustrating experience, and yet it is God who wants to direct every moment of our lives. He tells us: "Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will take care of itself" (Matthew 6:34). How often are our today's so preoccupied with our uncertain tomorrows that we never accomplish and fulfill what God would have us to do today? With the uncertainties created by the coronavirus, God has taught us that His love and His plan for our lives are certain. We can "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all things will be given to you as well" (Matthew 6:34).

A second learning experience for me is God releasing me from self-dependence to God-dependence. We most certainly know that we are to trust God wholeheartedly in all things. Yet, while we say it and may try to live it, we frequently depend too much on ourselves and lack trust in the enabling power of God. When we worry or doubt, when we work as if all of life depends on us, we forget Jesus' words of comfort: "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink.... Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life" (Matthew 6:25-27)? Look at the cross and behold the Lord's love in caring for you. Rest in His love!


Third, I am struck by the providential hand of God. We certainly don't understand all God's workings, but God has a perfect plan as He knows the future and what we need right now to take care of what will be before us. As was noted under "School News and Notes" in last month's Epistle, if God had not brought together the school staff we had this school year, e-learning would not have been a possibility and it would have left our school with the incapability of teaching our student body during this epidemic. God is good. He tells us: "I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" (Jeremiah 29:11). Yes, Christ the risen Savior has promised us: "All things will work for the good of those who love God, to those who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).

Fourth, what became clear through the pandemic and the continuance of St. Paul's ministry in the church and through the school is the importance of Christian teamwork. Not enough emphasis is placed on this concept, although it is emphasized again and again in the Bible (Romans 8:3-8; I Corinthians 12: Ephesians 4:7-16; I Peter 4:10-11). It is only as people stepped to the plate and put to use their God-given talents and abilities that the education through our school, Sunday school and worship services could continue. Thanks to all who gave of themselves that others could be blest in Christ, and may we all learn the importance of working together that the kingdom of God can move forward.

Thanks for those of you who responded to my request and shared with me what God has taught you through the coronavirus epidemic. God still is at work if we will only open our eyes and see the world through His Word.

I pray that you are better off today spiritually because of what God has been teaching you through the coronavirus and the eternal truths of His Word. We are a blessed people because our Lord and Savior reigns for the sake of His people eternally (Ephesians 1:20-23). Have a blessed day because of Jesus!

Christian Education:

In 2020 our Sunday School will continue to send \$75.00 each month to a mission. June Mission of the Month: Lutheran Braille Workers

Lutheran Braille Workers is the largest Christian ministry in the world that provides Braille and specialized Large Print Bibles free of charge for people who are Blind or Visually Impaired. Thanks to an army of volunteers and thousands of generous partners who financially support this ministry, Lutheran Braille Workers is able to get the Word of God into the hands of people who are Blind or Visually Impaired at no expense to them.

By engaging some 3,000 volunteers in over 110 Ministry Production Centers throughout the United States, Lutheran Braille Workers produces approximately 150,000 volumes a year of Braille and specialized Large Print Bibles and Christian literature.

In addition, Lutheran Braille Workers has over 40 Ministry Outreach Centers throughout the United States that minister to people who are Blind and Visually Impaired through the provision of resources they can use. Most importantly, Outreach Centers provide a family of love and care. Many people who would not otherwise hear about Jesus connect to God's Word and His people at Outreach Centers.

School Board:

Tuition expenses for school families are on going! In an effort to help our school families with school related expenses St. Paul's has <u>2 opportunities</u> for families to apply for scholarships. First, families with students in K-8 grades may apply for an <u>SGO (The Lutheran</u> <u>Scholarship Granting Organization of Indiana) Tuition Scholarship</u>. During the 2019-2020

school year, \$7,100 in Scholarships to St. Paul's came from this source. Secondly, St. Paul's has a <u>Church Scholarship fund</u> for preschool students who qualify and also for any K-8 student who does not qualify for an SGO scholarship but needs assistance. In the 2019-2020 school year approximately \$6,745 in Scholarship money came from this fund.

As a congregation we have 2 opportunities to help St. Paul's students! You may use your church envelope to donate to the Church Scholarship (Tuition Aid) fund and/or you may also check out and donate to St. Paul's SGO fund by going on line to Lutheransgo.org. If you have any questions regarding SGO, give Curt Nielsen a call at 248-1529.

As this school year has ended now is the time to think about helping students who will come to us in the fall!
