Our circuit visitor, Pastor Galen Drawbaugh will be of great assistance to you. The Lord has promised that He would send His Holy Spirit upon you to guide your ways that you may continue to do the Lord's work as you have faithfully done for almost 175 years.

As for me, I will also let the Holy Spirit guide me into the next chapter of my life. I know that it is important for the welfare of this congregation that upon my retirement I make a clean break from you as your pastor. This means you will not always see me at all kinds of meetings and other church activities. I will no longer be your pastor, but I will remain your brother in Christ.

Let me close with the words of the Apostle Paul as they express my feelings: "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy

because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this,

that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus” (Philippians 1:3-6).

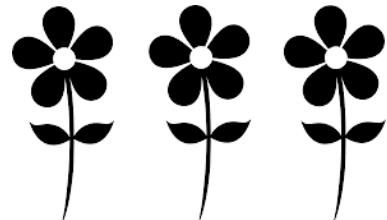
Operating budget fund balance as of June 18, 2020- \$71,500

Questions and Answers

with Pastor Micah, Robin, Samuel, Liza, David, and Lydia Wildauer

This informal interview presents a great view into the life of the Wildauer family while they lived in Togo. We are thankful they are here with our St. Paul's family and wish them God's blessings.



What do you miss about Togo?

(Answers are from youngest to oldest)

***Lydia, age 3:** I miss restaurants, the Wes family, the Robertson family, my bike, little puppy- daddy bring little puppy home and I touch it and pet it.

***David, age 5:** I miss my Paw Patrol puzzles, our books, the Christmas tree that we had there, the McDermotts, the Robertsons, the Wes family, my bike, our dogs, our ducks, the guardians, the house helper, Pastor Gaugert, I don't think there's anything else.

***Liza, age 7:** I miss my baby dolls.

***Samuel, age 9:** I miss playing with the Wes family.

***Robin:** I miss the simplicity of life, the families at the seminary, and our house helper.

***Pastor Micah:** I miss being in the classroom.

What do you like about the USA (or Indiana or Bremen)?

L: I love my cousins!

D: We have different legos, another marble track, new marker boards, Darth Vader (who "lives generously"), we have bikes here too, we have games, and our cousins are here, we can go jumping, swimming, and play at their playground. We can put out our trash here and watch the truck come and get it. My brother and sisters are here and that God is the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

L: I like that cousins are here.

S: I like the tasty food.

R: I like having family nearby, cooking dishes I haven't cooked in years, and driving on nice roads.

PM: Bremen is my hometown.

Name some favorite foods in Togo that are unlike American food.

L: Pintade is yummy in my tummy! Beignets (donuts) are yummy in my tummy too!

D: Ragout (African yams in a tomato based sauce), fufu (pounded African yams into a play-doh like substance with a spicy sauce). I loved the food, but I can't think of anything else.

L: Pintade (guinea fowl) and donkey meat.

S: Fufu, grilled pintade, grilled chicken, donkey liver, donkey tacos.

R: Rice and beans with an African sauce, fufu, pintade, and donkey meat.

PM: Alloco (fried plantains) and attieke (kasava root)

How is the church service/worship in Togo different from worship at St. Paul's?

L: I like to dance to music at church in Togo. Aunt Heidi sings in choir at church (St. Paul's).

D: There's French instead of English, benches instead of pews, drums instead of an organ.
L: The kids choir sings in a procession with the cross.
S: They sing in French in Togo.
R: A church service in Togo is long, sweaty, and dusty! St. Paul's is short, cool, and clean.
PM: Some congregations meet under large Mango trees because they don't have a building yet.

Describe a school day for us.

L: Just play with David.
D: Playing in the school building, instead of just the house. Sometimes someone brings a chicken during school and we watch them butcher it.
L: On normal school days, I learned the States and to read.
S: We walk out to our school building and Mama teaches us.
R: Our school days start out with family prayers in the house. After breakfast, we walk out to our school building. David and Lydia play with school toys or outside. Sam and Liza trade off time with me and independent work. After about 2 hours Liza joins the younger 2 playing or washing clothes with our house helper, while I work with Sam until lunch time. We eat lunch, have an hour rest time, and Catechesis with Daddio. School's out around 3pm, and it's time to play around the house or walk across the rocks to the Wes's (another missionary family).
PM: After prayers and breakfast with family I leave to teach at 8:30, followed by chapel at 10, and another course at 11:15. Everybody takes a 2 hour pause and then students come together for language courses in the afternoon. Since I don't teach languages, I catechize my children in the afternoon. The seminary study day concludes with a catechetical vespers service at 5:00.

What is the biggest challenge in returning to the USA?

L: I dunno.
D: That we had to go away from our toys.
L: I had to leave my baby dolls behind.
S: Our biggest challenge is riding in a small car.
R: The Evacuation! We had a day and a half to leave Dapaong, to plan our trip, buy tickets, get things in order in Dapaong, pack everything up that we wanted to bring back with us, say a couple good byes, but literally only a couple, we didn't get the chance to say goodbye to anyone at the seminary. We came to a lot of check points due to Covid that didn't want to let us through while on our way to Lomé and had to stop and stay at a hotel about 3 hours north of Lomé. A couple hours after we arrived in Lomé the next day, we learned our flight was cancelled and we'd have to wait 2 extra days in hopes of catching the next scheduled flight, not knowing rather it would happen or not. Thankfully we did fly on the next flight scheduled and didn't have any more problems, except for a cancelled flight in Newark, but that was actually nice because we were able to get a couple extra hours of sleep in Newark. And looking back, it was nice to have a couple extra days in Lomé to rest before flying across the Atlantic with 4 little ones.
PM: Adjusting to online communications with fellow teachers and leaders in Togo has been very challenging.

School Board:

Tuition expenses for school families are on going! In an effort to help our school families with school related expenses St. Paul's has **2 opportunities** for families to apply for scholarships. First, families with students in K-8 grades may apply for an **SGO (The Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization of Indiana) Tuition Scholarship**. During the 2019-2020 school year, \$7,100 in Scholarships to St. Paul's came from this source. Secondly, St. Paul's has a **Church Scholarship fund** for preschool students who qualify and also for any K-8 student who does not qualify for an SGO scholarship but needs assistance. In the 2019-2020 school year approximately \$6,745 in Scholarship money came from this fund.

As a congregation we have 2 opportunities to help St. Paul's students! You may use your church envelope to donate to the Church Scholarship (Tuition Aid) fund and/or you may also check out and donate to St. Paul's SGO fund by going on line to Lutheransgo.org. If you have any questions regarding SGO, give Curt Nielsen a call at 248-1529.

As this school year has ended now is the time to think about helping students who will come to us in the fall!

Stewardship:

I wanted to use this opportunity to reach out and update school families about some of the upcoming changes for the 2020-2021 school year. As you can probably guess, there will be some modifications that we will need to make as a school, to address the Covid-19 virus, and to continue our goal of providing an excellent Christian education to your students, in a safe environment.

As many of you know, I love sports! I enjoy coaching, watching my kids compete, and seeing all of the progress that students make from day 1, to the last day of the season. One of my favorite sports is basketball, and we are blessed here at St. Paul's to have two excellent basketball coaches. July Devotion: "The Affairs of Men!"

Psalm 33:12-15; 18-22 - Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, the people whom He has chosen as His heritage! The Lord looks down from heaven; He sees all the children of man; from where He sits enthroned He looks out on all the inhabitants of the earth, He who fashions the hearts of them all and observes all their deeds. ... Behold, the eye of the Lord is on those who fear Him, on those who hope in His steadfast love, that He may deliver their soul from death and keep them alive in famine. Our soul waits for the Lord; He is our help and our shield. For our heart is glad in Him, because we trust in His holy Name. Let your steadfast love, O Lord, be upon us, even as we hope in You.

On the birthday of the U.S. of A., we could spend a lot of time speaking about things right and things wrong in our nation. We could talk about present leaders who are trying and those who have given up. Instead, I would like to share some facts which have mostly been forgotten. For example:

1. Did you know shortly after breaking with England, the Continental Congress voted to buy and import 20,000 copies of Scripture for the people of the new nation?

2. Patrick Henry was the firebrand of the American Revolution: Did he say:

- a. "I regret I have but one life to give to my country"?
- b. "We must hang together, or we will all hang separately"?
- c. "Give me liberty or give me death"?

If you selected C, you did well. Now the bonus question. Finish the quote. (Pause.) Most folks can't do it because the

rest of what Henry said is no longer taught. This is what he said, "An appeal to arms and the God of hosts is all that is left to us. But we shall not fight our battle alone. There is a just God that presides over the destinies of nations. The battle, sir, is not of the strong alone. Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death."

You should also know Henry wasn't talking about some generic god or nebulous deity.

How do I know? I know because Mr. Henry told me. In his will Henry wrote, "I have now disposed of all my property to my family; there is one thing more I wish I could give them, and that is the Christian religion. If they have that, and I had not given them one shilling they would be rich; and if they had not this, and I had given them all this world, they would be poor." No doubt about it, the man had a gift for words.

Now this is the point where I'm supposed to say, "Sure wish we had people like Patrick Henry around today." Well, I'm not going to say that because I can't. The truth is I have met many men and women who remain committed to the Savior, who has rescued their souls from damnation.

They may not have Henry's flair for words, but the sincerity of their hearts cannot be questioned. They love the Lord who first loved them, and they faithfully share the Savior with their children. So, in this land of freedom, the Savior's story of salvation will always be told through all generations.

THE PRAYER: Dear Lord, for many years the Holy Scriptures have been attacked by puffed-up people. Today that attack is joined by those who would write You out of all history.
