She used this expression when times of trouble would arise. You may view this expression to be one of depression. Yet, this is not how my grandmother used it. For her it simply stated a reality about life found in the pages of Scripture. Job confessed: "Man born of woman is of few days and full of trouble" (Job 14:1). This trouble stems from the fact that man brought pain and trouble into the world when he sinned against God (Genesis 4:17), and nothing in life has been the same since.

Today we face all kinds of problems from a lack of rain to the coronavirus and all the havoc it has caused upon our way of life. It seems when everything is getting straightened out another problem comes to be. Yes, there is "always something."

This could all be very discouraging for us if it were not for Jesus' promise: "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world" (John 16:33). What does this mean? Shall we be free from the troubles of this life or have fewer troubles than those who don't know Christ? The Lord makes it clear that as long as we live in this world we will know troubles. In fact, as Christians we will not only know the troubles common to all mankind, but we will know additional persecutions and trials because of our Christian faith.

The comfort we have as Christians in the midst of life's troubles is God's promise: "The Lord will rescue me from every attack and will bring me safe to His heavenly kingdom" (II Timothy 4:18).

My grandmother was right in saying that there will always be some problem with which we will have to deal. More importantly, however, is that Jesus has washed away our sins and made us white in His blood" (Revelation 7:14), He now promises us that He will safely see us through all trails and troubles and in the end bring us safely into heaven's eternal bliss. "To Him be glory forever and ever. Amen" (II Timothy 4:18). Lessons In Stewardship: Following God's Plan for Your Life

Many Christians take delight in God's words found in Jeremiah 29:11, "'For I know the plans I have for you,' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." These words present a wonderful promise from God. Yet, how does one know God's plan for his life? Jesus taught us about how to know God's plan by the way He went about His time on earth.

Jesus could have easily been sidetracked from the Father's plan for His life by other people and by His own disciples. The crowds wanted Jesus for His miracles. Yet, Jesus denounced the wishes of the crowds when He said: "You are looking for Me... because you ate the loaves and had your fill." (Jesus is here referring to His miracle of the feeding of the 5,000.) "Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life" (John 6:26-27). When Jesus began to explain to His disciples that He was going to Jerusalem to suffer and die, their response showed their refusal to accept this plan for Jesus' life (Matthew 16:21-22).

Jesus could have easily lost the plan the heavenly Father had for His life which was to bring eternal prosperity to many through His death and resurrection. Jesus did not let the opinions of men deter Him from the Father's purpose for His life, as He spent time in prayer and meeting with the Father in solitude. Jesus noted in John chapter 5: "The Son can do nothing by Himself; He can do only what He sees the Father doing, because whatever the Father does the Son also does.... By Myself I can do nothing.... I seek not to please Myself but Him who sent Me" (verses 19, 30). The glorious plan of our redemption was fulfilled by Jesus, because Jesus remained in contact with the heavenly Father through time in prayer and reflection.

That we may know God's plan for our lives, our attention is not to be focused on the views of others, but on God's voice as He speaks to us through His Word and leads us by His Spirit. Don't adopt someone else's plan for your life, but follow Him who created your life, redeemed your life, and seeks to bring you to eternal glory in heaven.

#### **School Board:**

Tuition expenses for school families are on going! In an effort to help our school families with school related expenses St. Paul's has <u>2 opportunities</u> for families to apply for scholarships. First, families with students in K-8 grades may apply for an <u>SGO (The Lutheran</u> <u>Scholarship Granting Organization of Indiana) Tuition Scholarship</u>. During the 2019-2020 school year, \$7,100 in Scholarships to St. Paul's came from this source. Secondly, St. Paul's has a <u>Church Scholarship fund</u> for preschool students who qualify and also for any K-8 student who does not qualify for an SGO scholarship but needs assistance. In the 2019-2020 school year approximately \$6,745 in Scholarship money came from this fund.

As a congregation we have 2 opportunities to help St. Paul's students! You may use your church envelope to donate to the Church Scholarship (Tuition Aid) fund and/or you may also check out and donate to St. Paul's SGO fund by going on line to Lutheransgo.org. #### Stewardship:

#### "The fruit of the work of the Holy Spirit in us"

An athlete who is as strong as an ox and can run like the wind but has difficulty holding onto a football should not expect to have a place reserved for him in the Hall of Fame. A golfer who can drive the ball a country mile but has no short game should not have any expectation of ever wearing the green Master's jacket. A bowler who has a good strike ball but cannot pick up spares will never receive an invitation to the Tournament of Champions. To truly stand out as one who is great in a sport, an athlete must excel in all aspects of that sport.

And so it is with Christian living. To truly stand out as a light unto the world, a Christian must excel in all aspects of Christian living. The Apostle Paul addressed this in his second letter to the Corinthians with these words: "just as you excel in everything - in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us - see that you also excel in this grace of giving."

St. Paul raises a legitimate question: If you excel in so many aspects of your Christian life, how then can you choose to neglect one specific area, the grace of giving?

He answers this question in the verses which follow: "I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich. And here is my advice about what is best for you in this matter: Last year you were the first not only to give but also to have the desire to do so. Now finish the work, so that your eager willingness to do it may be matched by your completion of it, according to your means"

With Christ's love residing in our hearts, this grace of giving, doing that which benefits those around us to the glory of God, is a mark of the fruit of the work of the Holy Spirit in us. It is a demonstration of the love we have toward Christ, the one who first loved us.

And we do this by the power of the Gospel as we pray each day, "In Word and Sacrament, give us the full measure of the Holy Spirit so that we may excel in everything we do according to your will, including this grace of giving. In Jesus' name, Amen."

### August Devotion: "Entirely His"

Romans 8:35-39 - Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? As it is written, "For Your sake we are being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered." No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us. For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

These days we've all had to experience some type of disconnect from people and places. Whether it's a separation from the work place or from the classroom or from friends and family, it's been an ordeal, to say the least. For many there's been the very difficult situation of being apart from loved ones who are sick. We've likely all seen the poignant images of individuals keeping their distance and looking in on a family member or friend through a window—so as not to potentially spread any disease or get it from someone else.

For believers, separation from others in the family of faith has its own difficulties, too. We draw special strength from gathering together in the Name of Jesus (see 1 Thessalonians 5:10-11; Hebrews 10:24-25; Colossians 3:16). In the *Apostles' Creed*, we speak of "the holy Christian church, the communion of saints," which gives us spiritual uplift and fellowship with one another. And you may have noticed in your own life how the recent suspension of church services has impacted your faith in some ways.

How good it is to know that there is nothing that can come between Jesus and His love for us. Whatever life brings our way—trials, persecution, a worldwide virus—we are secure in God's embracing and unchangeable love for His creatures. He has made that plainly known to us by sending His Son to save us from our sins. Jesus came specifically to *bridge* the distance that separated us from God. Having taken on our flesh and blood, God entered our world for the sole purpose of bringing us back to Him so that, never again, will we be separated from Him.

As you continue to deal with the persistent threat of this virus, lay hold of the riches God has given to us. He has reconciled us to Himself (see 2 Corinthians 5:18); He has given us all things we need to live a godly life (see 2 Peter 1:3); and He promises to be with us always (see Hebrews 13:5). These are the things He has done for us, His children, people who can in no way be separated from the God who loves them.

**THE PRAYER**: Heavenly Father, remind us by Your Holy Spirit that we are firmly in Your hands. In Jesus' Name we pray. Amen. (Written by Paul Schreiber)
