Then, if I need to return an item, it can become a hassle. Besides, it takes time and who has that available! Beside, I get all my purchase price returned, without hassle.

As much as I like to shop locally, sometimes it is hard to find the exact item I need or it needs to be ordered and that takes time. As a result, I use Amazon for many of my purchases. They have just about anything I would ever need and I can get the item within a day or two and if I need to return it, I just go to UPS and drop it off.

Since I do so much shopping on Amazon, I started using Amazon Smile for many of my purchases. Amazon Smile is a separate portal from Amazon's main site, offers the same items, prices, and benefits as Amazon.com, but with one distinct difference: When I shop on AmazonSmile, Amazon's Foundation contributes 0.5% of the price of eligible purchases to the charity of my choice. There are many charities available but St. Paul's is the one I like.

There is no cost to the church or myself and 100% of the 0.5% donation goes to the my charity of choice, namely St. Paul's. For October through December last year, St. Paul's received a \$103.03 donation. It doesn't seem like much but since we have been in the program, we have received \$1,508.75 for our use without any obligation to either the church or ourselves.

What you need to know about stewardship

A steward is someone who is appointed to take care of or look after another's property.

God created us in His image to be His managers over the world He created (<u>Genesis 1:27-30</u>). We are responsible to God for how we manage our lives and the resources that come into our possession because everything we have we owe to Him.

No matter where we are in our walk with Jesus, there is always a next step in stewardship.

<u>Psalm 24:1</u> declares, "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it..." Since God made everything, knows everything, and owns everything, His perspective of how we should manage our lives and resources is perfect. God can see how our choices and decisions will affect us today and how the consequences, good or bad, will affect our families for generations. ANNOUNCEMENT FROM PARISH PLANNING COUNCIL

Indiana Revitalization Program for St. Paul's

Our congregation has seen a lot of challenges in the last few years: retirement of Barb Middaugh , Ken Eichinger, Wendy Coxey and Jim Russell from the Day School and Pastor Rohde from his call as Administrative Pastor ; turmoil over Covid-19 which stopped (for a while) in-person worship service, Bible class and Sunday School attendance. We stopped having gatherings such as potlucks and social events. We then resumed in-person attendance with "social distancing" and face masks (and controversy over face masks), implementing a second worship service for those who would not attend worship service unless social distancing and face masks were implemented for all who attended.

Once Covid-19 concerns began to diminish, we eliminated social distancing and face masks requests and encouraged everyone to attend worship service, Bible class and bring their children to Sunday School. Some members have not to attend worship service or Bible class, some have chosen to attend worship service but not Bible class and most with Sunday-School aged youth have chosen not to bring their children to Sunday School.

We have all heard or made comments about how we hope things can get back to "normal" again, although normal may have been redefined and we may not recognize it. Sometimes we need step back and listen and observe what God is telling us and sometimes we need someone from outside our congregation come in and help us listen and observe.

In the Voters Meeting on April 25th, a resolution was presented by the Board of Lay Ministry based on agreement from Parish Planning Council to enroll St Paul's congregation in a Revitalization Program offered by Indiana District of LCMS. The voters approved the enrollment. This program requires that our church boards (through Parish Planning Council in one document) submit to Indiana District office of Missions a self-analysis study that helps us and District understand our past, present and future service to Christ and the Gospel. The District will send a "team" to meet with Parish Planning Council over a weekend after the self-analysis study is submitted to District to analyze our programs and activities and recommend actions that they feel will help us in our missions to members and the community. At the end of this weekend session, the District Team will present a report outlining their recommendations. We will have 45 days to decide on whether we wish to implement their recommendations. If we decide to proceed, the District Office of Missions will assist us in coaching and encouragement in implementing the recommendations for up to 18 months.

We will not know the date of the weekend session with the District Team until after they receive the unified self-analysis study from Parish Planning Council. The date of the weekend session will be announced as soon as it is set.

New Testament Standard Giving

Newsletter Article – July 2022

Whenever the topic of stewardship and giving comes up, the conversation inevitably turns to the question: "How much should I give?" Answers will vary because the motive behind such questions vary also.

Sometimes the motive behind asking this question is for self-justification. Even though as Lutherans, we know that we are not saved by our works but by grace through faith because of Jesus' substitutionary atonement. Yet the natural religion of fallen man is to earn God's favor by what we do.

Take for example the response of our Lord to the rich young ruler who asked, "what

must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus first tells him to keep the commandments. The rich young ruler responds by indicating that all this he has kept from his youth. But Jesus tells him that he lacks one thing: He must sell all that he has and give it to the poor and then follow him. This rich, young ruler went away sad because he was quite wealthy and could not part with his possessions.

Here we see that those who seek to justify themselves by their giving will hear a response that intensifies the duty that God places upon them. Indeed, they will hear a response that makes it impossible to win God's favor by their works.

But to those who genuinely desire to know what their duty is, as Christians, in the arena of giving, we look to the Bible for our answer. We believe that the Bible is the Word of God. And we know that the Word of God has been "breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim. 3:16–17).

So, we begin to answer the question, "What should I give?" with the question, "What does the Bible say about how much we should give and to whom?"

The Old Testament is explicit. The expectation is that the people of God would give a tithe, that is 10 percent, of the first fruits of their labor to support the full-time ministry of the Levites. This is what the Lord gave Moses to teach the people:

"You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, because the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the money for whatever you desire—oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household. And you shall not neglect the Levite who is within your towns, for he has no portion or inheritance with you.

"At the end of every three years you shall bring out all the tithe of your produce in the same year and lay it up within your towns. And the Levite, because he has no portion or inheritance with you, and the sojourner, the fatherless, and the widow, who are within your towns, shall come and eat and be filled, that the Lord your God may bless you in all

the work of your hands that you do." (Deuteronomy 14:22–29)

This principle of tithing is carried over into the New Testament, though not explicitly by calling it a tithe. St. Paul teaches the Church at Corinth this: We are to give to the church regularly (1 Cor. 16:1–2), proportionally (1 Cor. 16:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:12), and generously (2 Cor. 8:20) of our first fruits (1 Cor. 16:1–2; Gen. 4:4; Prov. 3:9; Lev. 27:30) with a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor. 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor. 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor. 9:7), and love (2 Cor. 8:23). And all of this is because the "Lord has ordained that those who preach the Gospel should make their living by the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14), just as the Levites did.

This our New Testament standard. Since Christ became poor for us in order to make us rich in Him – blessing us with the riches of heaven – so we also have been so blessed to follow the example of our Lord and Savior and give of ourselves and the work of our hands to bless others with the same.

If we have been lax in this, let us – like our Lord, who for the joy set before Him endured the cross and scorned its shame – likewise begin to work toward this goal of regular giving of a generous proportion of the first fruits of God's giving to us. And let us do so not begrudgingly, but for the joy set before us—with a spirit of eagerness, cheerfulness, and love—to share the blessings of God with those placed into our care.

Acknowledging and Overcoming Acedia (Part 2 of 3)

This is the continuing look at "Consider the Ant" from the March 2022 edition of The Lutheran Witness which dealt with the concept of acedia, or sloth in one's faith life. Author Jason Braaten explains how acedia can inhibit our actions to avoid potential pain.

In the first installment we showed the first way that acedia can manifest in our faith life, distraction. Now we look at the next possible manifestation.

Indifference – We may also respond in a second way: indifference. A hard-hearted indifference "believes in nothing...[and] only remains alive because there is nothing it would die for." God spare us from being so empty and shallow.

We also struggle with a soft indifference. It is not that we believe in nothing, but that we believe in merely some things. This indifference cannot be bothered to care about everything the Lord has laid upon us. It looks at the tasks that lie ahead, then it shrugs and says under its breath: "Whatever."

This thinking reduces all of what God has given us to merely some of it. Fathers indulge this indifference if they think they have fulfilled God's vocational commands merely by going to work to provide food and clothing, house and home for those placed under their care. They come home, kick back and relax while there remains more "adulting" to do. They think they have done it all by doing only this part. They are indifferent toward all the other things – family devotions, catechizing children, conversing with family, helping with homework, completing home repairs and teaching others to do the same. These fathers are not indifferent in every way, but in some ways. And they have used our rich doctrine of vocation to justify slothful indifference.

This indifference has influenced the mindset of our young also. If you listen to the prophets of despair in the news, our youth inhabit a world of doom and gloom – rising debts and sea levels, seemingly no prospects for jobs or families. Our youth no longer ask how they can have it all (career, marriage, children), but whether it is worth doing any of it. Instead of trying, they opt for hedonism: "Let's eat, drink, and be merry, for tomorrow we die." This reduces enjoyment of God's provision to what he provides now instead of waiting in hope to enjoy what he has promised in the future. But the result is the same: We miss out on everything God gives because we reduced it to some.

Has God not promised to bless all that he gives? We use our rich theology to justify indifference and inaction because the work is painful, difficult and demanding. Its yield may not be seen perhaps for years or only by those who succeed us. We should not avoid the pain: "The only long-range solution to pain, whether physical or spiritual is to listen to what it is telling us. It is a symptom."

Will we really stand before the One who called us and say, "Master, I knew you to be a hard man, reaping where you did not sow and gathering where you scattered no seed, so I was afraid and I went and hid your talent in the ground. Here, you have what is yours" (MATT. 25:24-25)?

Consider the ant – How do we combat our immediate, knee-jerk reactions to sloth? Solomon tells his son to consider the ant: "Go to the ant, O sluggard; consider her ways and be wise. Without having any chief, officer, or ruler, she prepares her bread in summer and gathers her food in harvest" (PROV. 6:6-8) What does the ant do? She acts in accordance with how God created her. She

does what needs to be done. She keeps on keeping on until she is done. No one stands over her shoulder telling her what to do. The ant just does.

There is a parallel here for us. No one watches over our shoulder or drives us to do the work in our vocations that must be done. We have commands from our Father in heaven, but we are not given the exact manner in which to do them.

Do we make use of that freedom to begin work while it is day? Or do we allow this freedom to stymie us? Do we use this freedom to chase distractions from the pain of that work, to become indifferent? Consider the ant.

Do I too often not acknowledge my distraction and indifference? If I do acknowledge it, what then? I tend to lean heavily on the grace we treasure. Maybe there's a better way.

In the next segment, we will look at Rev. Braaten's remedy to the acedia in our lives.

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, clothed in white robes, and from where have they come?" I said to him, "Sir, you know." And he said to me, "These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes

and made them white in the blood of the Lamb." Revelation 7:13-14

There are things which bring back memories; there are things which are heirlooms or antiques; there are things which are personally precious to us as individuals. The value on those items is far more to us than anyone else would be willing to pay if the item were put up for auction.

Here is an example: there is a little piece of silk in a Springfield, Illinois, museum. If you were to go to a fabric store, and if they would be willing to sell you a piece of cloth so small, it would cost you no more than a penny or two. That being said, there is no amount of money which would enable you to purchase this piece of silk. That's because this bit of cloth is stained with blood.

Now that is an interesting fact, but that fact hardly explains why this bit of material is considered to be so precious. Its value only becomes clear when you are told this bit of silk was once part of the dress worn by the girl who sat in the presidential box the

night Abraham Lincoln was murdered. As he was dying, she cradled his head in her lap, just as a mother might hold her child.

It is his blood which has stained that cloth.

Long ago the State of Illinois bought that dress, cut out that piece of silk, and placed it out for public viewing so all could see. Because of the blood of a great man, that pitiful piece of fabric has a value beyond reckoning.

So, let me now ask you, what are you worth?

Looking at your sinful soul, at all the transgressions you have committed, the answer would have to be, "Not much. Not much at all." But when a person is brought to faith, when those sins are washed away by the precious blood of Jesus Christ, things change.

Your soul, which once was condemned to eternal punishment in hell, has been given new value, a wonderful value. At the cost of the life of God's Son, our Savior, you have been washed of your sins; the old is gone and a new value is placed upon you.

<u>The Time of the Church</u>: Sundays after Trinity Sunday are designated Weeks after Pentecost. With only a few exceptions, the color is green.

Trinity symbols: the 'unique', and oldest symbol is The Equilateral Triangle, representing Unity in Trinity and Trinity in Unity. Though it has three sides, it forms one

figure. Because each 'leg' is the same length, it shows the three Person of the Trinity are equally God. Δ



The next two symbols are often used as embroidery emblems, because of their graceful and artistic forms. The Triquetra forms one continuous line of three equal arcs. The Three Circles, representing eternity and unity, are intertwined to form only one figure, while showing three distinct circles. Δ

The Trinity banner's symbol is The clover-shaped. The individual symbols Manus Dei, the Hand of God. Usually commanded not to make any kind of Extended downward, it shows blessing Agnus Dei, Lamb of God, from as God's own sacrificial Lamb, The Lamb w/Cross and The Holy Spirit is depicted by the Triangle and Trefoil. A Trefoil is for the Persons of the Trinity are: it is only the hand, as we are image and call it God/the Creator. towards mankind. The Three Nails, in the INRI window and on the black paraments. Western art uses three for two reasons: 1) the belief that Jesus' feet were crossed and one nail pierced both, and 2) three is the number of the Trinity, so the symbol represents that all three Persons of the Godhead are active in our salvation. Δ

The fish symbol (vesica), used alone represents Jesus. The Three Fish

symbol (from the Chrismon Tree) shows that man's salvation comes from the Triune God - and Jesus is True God. Each fish is equal in size

and shape. The Greek word for 'fish,' IX θ YC, makes the acrostic: Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior. Δ

The Shield of the Trinity, which employs the equilateral triangle, circles, and a doctrinal statement of Christian belief (usually in Latin) of the Triune God. Corner circles say Father (Pater), Son (Filius), and Spirit (Spiritu Sanctus); the center one says God (Deus). The lines leading from circle to circle say is not (non est), while those to the center say is (est). Therefore, the Father is not the Son or the Spirit, the Father is God; the Son is not the Father or the Spirit, the Son is God; the Spirit is not the Father or the Son, the Spirit is God. Δ Usually in Christian symbolism and art, the use of any three identical or repetitive symbols is meant to evoke the remembrance of the Triune God. The 'Holy, Holy, Holy' of the green altar cloth is

an example; or the 'Triple Amen' after the Benediction; or the 'Three Clusters of Grapes' at

Ascension, Christ the King Sunday (Son); Trinity Sunday (God); Thanksgiving, (Father). The
