From Pastor Wonnacott's keyboard:

We are blessed to begin this month with Holy Week since April 2<sup>nd</sup> is Palm Sunday. The Lord enters Jerusalem on a donkey and is hailed as the Son of David. Hosannas ring out and people wave palm branches in praise and adoration. The King has arrived in the city!

Maundy Thursday follows as the day Jesus institutes the Lord's Supper. Jesus gives us His very body and blood for the forgiveness of sins, giving us a new covenant. Jesus and the disciples then go to the garden, where He is betrayed with a kiss from the disciple Judas Iscariot. The other disciples, led by Peter, try to fight for Jesus, but Jesus stops them, explaining that He must suffer and die to fulfill Scripture.

On Good Friday we learn that Jesus is nearly silent, except for a few words, as He hangs on the cross. But these seven Last Words provide a window into His mission, a way to understand what is important to this One who is dying on our behalf. **1.** *"Father, forgive* 

them, they know not what they do." (Luke 23:34) 2. "This day you will be with Me in Paradise."

From your Stewardship Board...It's Tax Time again so don't forget about a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD).

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) is a distribution from your individual retirement account (IRA) to a qualified charity. You must be age 70½ or older to make a qualified charitable distribution. A qualified charitable distribution is not taxed, nor is it included in your taxable income.

If certain conditions are met, QCDs also can count toward the required minimum distributions

(RMDs) that people who are age 73 or older must meet each year if they have traditional IRAs (or

a number of other tax advantaged retirement plans that you can't use for a QCD). Also important:

You don't have to itemize on your tax return to take advantage of a QCD.

# UPDATE ON CALL COMMITTEE AND REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

A decision was made in 2022 to "pause" the call committee's search for call candidates for Administrative Pastor ministry vacated by Pastor Rohde's retirement. This decision was made, in part, due to a need to re-evaluate our congregation's mission, it's needs and our present "health" as a congregation physically, emotionally and spiritually. Indiana District offices offered a "Revitalization Program" which would help us evaluate our congregation and strengthen our efforts towards our mission as a congregation. A weekend in the fall of 2022 saw the assembling of our church and school staff and chairmen of all church boards with a team from Indiana District to help us analyze, discuss and plan on actions we need to take as a congregation to move forward in a God-pleasing manner in service to God and our community. The report from that Revitalization Program weekend was presented at conclusion of that weekend's Sunday worship service and hard copies of the report were made available for several weeks in the narthex of the church.

#### So.....what activities are going on now?

**Revitalization Program :** Some of the first actions to be taken were to contact the Town of Bremen ( town council, police dept. and fire dept.) to see if there are areas of needs that we could provide assistance in (ministry to community) and also contact other churches in community to see what local mission work they are engaged in. These actions are being worked on by the Board of Lay Ministry and Pastor Wonnacott. There are two areas of our ministry where St. Paul's needs training in order to do a better job: encouraging delinquent/inactive members to attend and participate in worship services and church activities and being disciples to provide the Gospel message to all we come in contact with...including other members of our congregation. There are two training workshops that have been ordered from Synod to address these needs: "Shepherding the Strays" and "Connect to Disciple". Materials for these training workshops have been received recently and actions are being taken to get started. "Shepherding the Strays" training will be taken by Board of Lay Ministry and "Connect to Disciple" training will be taken by Day and Preschool staffs and chairmen of all church boards. Other actions recommended by the Indiana District Revitalization team will be worked on after the actions mentioned above are completed.

**Call Committee:** The Call Committee (Board of Lay Ministry) is presently engaged in reviewing the information provided to Indiana District which outlined what we felt our congregational needs are for an administrative pastor. This re-assessment of needs is necessary as a result of the Revitalization Program we are engaged in. As we continue working on actions prescribed by the Revitalization team, the needs of our congregation relative to an administrative pastor may continue to change. Patience is needed as we seek what God's answer is in this area.

So, there's nothing the rest of the congregation needs to do if not a staff member or a chairman of a church board, right? Wrong...each one of us, as Christians, have responsibility

to minister to others and share the Gospel...it's not the sole responsibility of Pastor, School staff or church boards. Notice someone whom you haven't seen in church since pre-Covid? Call them, tell them you've missed them....ask if you can help in any way. Pray for our congregation that God's will be done and that ALL will see God's direction to use the talents He provides each of us. We are all members of one body and we need all members of our congregation/body to participate with our time, talents and treasures. This year, we will have election of officers/church boards at the June voters meeting. Your participation is needed in serving God by serving on a church board, committee or service group. Please remember, Jesus did not ask the disciples when He recruited them if they felt they had the time or abilities to follow Him and continue the ministry. It was the first priority in their lives. Scriptures don't tell us to only carry out the Great Commission if we feel we have time. What priority do we place on how we serve God? Each of us should prayerfully consider how we can do a better job serving God through the ministries at St. Paul's.

May God bless you as you pray on ways you can serve God. Blessings on your day.

#### **Blessed Shall You Be**

"Blessed shall you be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out." (Deuteronomy 28:3-6)

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground, their wombs, their flocks, or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the LORD your God." (Deut. 28:2b) If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you." (Deut. 28:2a). If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and "walk in his ways" (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh and fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ died for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit. By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon his work, not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, and His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and it thereby becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve, and obey Him. This is not in order to receive the blessings but because in Christ we already have. With this in mind, we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).

"Take What God Gives"

Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. James 1:16-17

Years ago, I heard about a pastor who asked a six-year-old-girl in his congregation whether she wanted a baby brother or a baby sister.

Apparently the little girl's mother, who was still about two months away from delivery, had spent some time discussing the possibilities with her daughter. I say that because of the little girl's reply. With a sigh, and a tone which said she thought the preacher who had asked such a silly question might be just a little bit

slow, the girl answered, "You know, Pastor, sometimes you just gotta take what God gives you."

How's that for a profound answer? Both profound and true.

Sadly, many people don't agree with the girl. When they think of the Lord, they imagine Him to be capricious and malevolent. Rather than believing He is the Giver of every good and perfect gift, they blame Him for all the sadness and sorrow they have ever encountered.

So, just what is it the Lord has given us?

Look to the Gospels and you will see how the Lord treats His lost and rebellious children. Rather than letting us eternally stew in our sins, the Lord sent His Son into the world to rescue us. Yes, look to the Gospels and there you will see Jesus correct those who were overly proud, and lift up those who were crushed down by guilt. Look to Scripture and see how Jesus befriended the lonely, offered forgiveness to those burdened by sin, and gave life to those who were dead in body and soul.

But there's more.

Look and see Jesus arrested. When they came for Him He was carrying our sins, every one of them. Still carrying those sins, He was condemned to die on the cross. There, on Golgotha's height, the Innocent was sacrificed to save the guilty. Then with His work of rescuing us having been completed, Jesus rose from the dead. You can check it out for yourself. Go to His sepulcher on Resurrection Sunday and see that the Lord has risen and left His empty burial clothes behind. Stand with the disciples in their locked room and receive the peace of the living Lord. Listen to Him as He shares the news of His victory over sin, death and devil. Receive His gift which says salvation is freely given to all who are brought to a saving faith in Him as the Savior. Yes, look to the Gospels and see how the risen Redeemer has promised to be with us and send His Holy Spirit, the Comforter, to give us hope and a new life.

Like the little girl said, sometimes you just have to receive the things the Lord gives us.

Thank God for those gifts!

Thank God you are a believer. Thank God for the fact that no matter what sorrow and sadness come your way, you have a Savior who cares about you and will carry your burdens. Thank God He is the Giver of every good and perfect gift.

\* The center of the Church Calendar is the day commonly called Easter Sunday, in England and America. The English name "Easter," either comes from an Old / Middle English word *ester*, having to do with *spring*; or *ostern*, meaning the direction in which the sun rises. Christian communities in other nations used names deriving from Passover (Pesach in Hebrew) Jesus is our Passover / Paschal Lamb. \* At 3 p.m., on Holy Saturday, the Season of Lententide ends and the Season of Easter begins. Lasting 7 weeks, this *Season* observes the three most significant festival days of the Church: **The Feast of The Resurrection of Our Lord**; 2nd - forty days after Easter Sunday is **The Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord**; and 10 days later, Pentecost, **The Feast of the Holy Spirit**. The liturgical colors are *white* for Easter and Ascension, which are festivals of God the Son; and *red*, the color of the Holy Spirit, for Pentecost. \* Considered the 'queen' of feasts, no other day is given as much emphasis as Easter Sunday; because its focus is on Christ's resurrection from the dead and all that it means for our redemption and salvation: we have been redeemed by the blood of Christ; our sins and its guilt have been forgiven and we are justified (declared "not guilty") by His death on the cross; and we are guaranteed the sure and certain hope of our own resurrection and eternal life: "Which He [God] promised before through His prophets in the Holy Scriptures, concerning His Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who was born of the seed of David according to the flesh, and declared to be the Son of God with power, according to the Spirit of holiness, by the resurrection from the dead, ...among whom you also are the called of Jesus Christ;" Romans 1:2-4,6 \* Soli Deo Gloria \*
