LCMS Stewardship Ministry –Newsletter Article – May 2023 Living Sacrifices

Stewardship is not just about giving money to the church. It includes this, to be sure, but it is not limited to it. Stewardship involves our whole life – everything we have and everything we are.

Let us not, though, fall into the trap of thinking that because we give of ourselves in one area then we can neglect giving in another. Stewardship is not stealing from Peter to pay Paul. It is not a game that we play whereby we justify ourselves in not giving a tenth of our income because we have given in some other way.

This is why our Lord warns: "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done, without neglecting the others." (Matthew 23:23) We are given to do both – tithe of ourselves and what we have.

And so it is that St. Paul makes his appeal to us: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good

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and acceptable and perfect." (Romans 12:1–2)

We are to present our bodies as a living sacrifice to God. We are not to have the mind of the world, where we exchange equal weight of this for an equal weight of that and think that we have done what God has required. Our whole life is given over for service in and for the Church of God. This is to be done in thanksgiving for what God in Christ has accomplished for us. This is our spiritual worship, the reasonable response to what He has done for us. Not one for the other but all in all.

But what does this look like? St. Paul never lays down a general principle without also giving us some practical application of what shape that principle is to take concretely. He gives the general principle that our bodies are to be living sacrifices to God. And, after admonishing those who have been given particular gifts of grace to serve the church, St. Paul then speaks generally of what is expected of all. He says:

"Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor. Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality." (Romans 12:9–13)

This is what it looks like to present your bodies as living sacrifices. This is how we live out the grace of God here in time.

Let us then heed the apostle's teaching. Let us present our bodies – everything that we have and everything that we are – as living sacrifices to God, our reasonable response to what God in Christ Jesus accomplished for us by His death and resurrection. Through this, we have forgiveness of sins, a new life in Christ, and eternal salvation. And through this worship, the grace of God is made manifest in His saints – for the church and the world.

"I Am Jesus' Little Lamb "

"I am Jesus' little lamb, Ever glad at heart I am; For my Shepherd gently guides me, Knows my need and well provides me, Loves me ev'ry day the same, Even calls me by my name.

"Who so happy as I am, Even now the Shepherd's lamb? And when my short life is ended, By His angel host attended, He shall fold me to His breast, There within His arms to rest."

The prophet Isaiah spoke of a day to come when God Himself would visit His people. He would tend His flock like a shepherd. He would gather the lambs in His arms and carry them close to His heart (see Isaiah 40:11). The hymn, "I Am Jesus' Little Lamb," celebrates Jesus, our Shepherd and Savior, who came among us as the prophet foretold. The hymn speaks of the Shepherd's love for us and our joy in His care. It is a hymn for little children and for all of God's children of every age in life. In Baptism our Shepherd calls us by name and makes us His own. The early lessons of faith we learnthat Jesus loves us, that He knows our needs and gently guides us-are confirmed in our lives as the years pass.

The Good Shepherd, who gave His life to save us, loves us "every day the same." In a world of uncertainty and fear, this is certain: Jesus loves you every day the same. Jesus your Shepherd is "the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8b). This is the same Shepherd who carried you before you were born and who promises, "Even to your old age I am He, and to gray hairs I will carry you. I have made, and I will bear; I will carry and will save" (Isaiah 46:4). You were chosen, in fact, to be His own before you were born, even before the world was created (see Ephesians 1:4).

There are times when we wander from the Shepherd, as lambs often do, perhaps trying to distance ourselves from His watchful care or imagining that greener pastures may be found elsewhere. But our Shepherd laid down His life to save His sheep. He seeks us out, His wandering, doubting, fearful lambs, and rescues us with His forgiveness and love.

Whatever your age, you are a child of God; you are Jesus' precious little lamb. The Shepherd, who has always loved you, will love you "every day the same" throughout your earthly years and for all eternity.

May Major Festivals: **18** The Ascension of Our Lord: (Thursday) Next to Easter, the most important theological observance of the Church Year. Always celebrated as part of Easter; specific observance since 600 AD. Historically took place on the Mount of Olives, 40 days after Christ's resurrection. "He also presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God." Acts 1:3 • He promises The Gift of The Holy Spirit: "He will give you another Helper, that He may abide with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees Him nor knows Him; but you know Him, for He dwells with you and will be in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come to you." John 14:16-18 • He is Exalted: "… when He raised Him from the dead and seated Him at His right hand in the heavenly places, far above all principality and power and might and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in that which is to come." Eph. 1:20-22 • His Eternal Reign: "And He put all things under His feet, and gave Him to be head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of Him who fills all in all." Eph. 1:23 • His Second Coming: "This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw Him go into heaven." Acts 1:11 **& 28 Pentecost: Feast of the Holy Spirit**: color red, for the blood of Christ & of martyrs, fire of the Holy Spirit, zeal, & missionary spirit. Celebrated as part of Easter since the

3rd century; it concludes Easter Season & The Time of Easter. • The first Christian Day of Pentecost occurred at the Jewish Feast of Weeks, when all Jewish males by the Law were required to appear at the Temple. Acts 2 • The focus Holy Spirit pouring out His gifts upon the Church, to fulfill The Great Commission. "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." Acts 1:8 & May Minor Festivals: 1 St. Philip & St. James, Apostles: color red. apostle Philip, when called, went & found Nathanael, bringing him to Jesus. Jesus tested him in the miracle of the loaves. Symbol: Cross / Loaves - his martyrdom, as tradition says he was crucified in Asia Minor & his words to Jesus. John 1:43-48; 6:5-7; 12:21-22; 14:8-9 • James the Less / Younger. Symbol: saw, believed martyred by being sawn asunder. Appears only in Gospel lists of The Twelve. 2 31 The Visitation: Originated 13th century; Mary's visit to Elizabeth (mother of John the Baptist) after the angel Gabriel's announcement she would be the mother of Messiah; during which she speaks the Magnificat, "My soul doth magnify the Lord ..." Luke 1:39-56 & Occasional Festival: 21 Rite of Jr. Confirmation: celebrates a specific event in a member's life. Rite: a set order (liturgy) followed in a ceremonial or religious service; including words & actions. • LC-MS normally observes this Rite towards the end of a child's 8th-grade school year. Luther's Small Catechism, 1529, is the basis for required doctrinal instruction in the Christian faith, before Confirmation & receiving The Lord's Supper. • Connected to The Sacrament of Holy Baptism: as the congregation once confessed the Christian faith into which an infant is baptized, now the confirmand confesses personal faith in Christ; in the Bible as the inerrant Word of God; and the truth of the church's teachings, as drawn from Scripture. An adult may take instruction and be baptized / confirmed at any age. 2 Commemorations: 2 Athanasius of Alexandria, Pastor & Confessor: Orthodox theologian of the early Church; opposed heresy [false teaching] all of his adult life. At the Council of Nicea, 325, the deity of Christ was challenged by Arius, an aged deacon, who said belief in Jesus and the Father as equally God was too close to belief in many gods; thus, he held Jesus was not fully God; nor eternal, the highest of created beings; not of the same essence as the Father. Alarmed bishops called on Constantine to "protect the Church from Arius." Athanasius, a mere 25 years old, gave the orthodox view: If Christ were less than God, He could not be our Savior; only God can reconcile man to Himself; only a Divine Savior could offer a sufficient sacrifice. His zeal led the Council to formulate the Church's 1st written confession, The Nicene Creed; reaffirmed 381, when the 3rd article was added. • Early 5th century, a Trinitarian Creed was written & given Athanasius' name, doubtless to honor a lifetime defense of the Trinity & the deity of Christ and the Holy Spirit. It begins: "Whosever will be saved ..." LSB pg. 319 • 'Gospels' & 'epistles' contrary to Apostolic teaching appeared by 100 AD. Marcion, c. 150, accepted only Luke & 10 epistles. More lists appeared & Church leaders determined a Canon [approved list] of Scripture was needed. Athanasius' Easter Festal letter, 367, listed 27 writings then in use by the Church as the only inspired works, & the only ones upholding doctrinal truth. No doubt his rule was the treatment of Christ's incarnation & deity, and recognized Apostolic authorship. Thirty years later, The Council of Carthage, 397, adopted that list; we call it The New Testament. • 4 Friedrich Wyneken, Pastor & Missionary: "Lutheran Apostle to the West" 1st pastor/ missionary associated with Missouri Synod; her 2nd president, 1850-1864. Reading of German Lutherans spiritual needs in America, he felt "compelled by conscience;" yet did not wish to go. "But if I stayed, I wouldn't be able to look up to you [the Lord] and pray to you. So, then, I surely must go of my free will." Left Bremen, Germany, July 1838. The Pennsylvania German Ev. Lutheran Synod sent him to cover parts of Indiana, Illinois, & Missouri to "search for scattered German Protestants" &

"whenever possible, form congregations." • Ill health caused his return to Germany, to seek help; his pleas were answered by Pastor Loehe in sending students & books. Back in America, began an Indian mission (Frankenmuth). When St. Louis could not meet the demand for pastors, he helped establish Ft. Wayne Seminary. pg. 18, 150th Anniversary Book & 5 Frederick the Wise, Christian Ruler: Defender of Luther & the Reformation. Luther was condemned by the Edict of Wörms, 1521, so he kept Martin safe from the Pope's wrath by 'kidnapping' and hiding him in Wartburg Castle, where Luther used his time to translate the Bible into German. • 7 C. F. W. Walther, Theologian: Emigrated to America near St. Louis, with about 600 "Saxon Lutherans," 1839; 1st president, 1847, of German Ev. Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio, and Other States (now Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod). 'Father of American Lutheran Confessionalism,' his led in establishing a governance based on: a right distinction between Law & Gospel; a sound understanding of justification by faith; & an unqualified belief in Scripture as the inspired, inerrant Word of God. • 9 Job Satan claimed God's protection caused Job's faithfulness. In declaring his suffering was not because he was guilty of some sin, he overstated his innocence, & God Himself sets him straight. 38-42 • Job testifies to a bodily resurrection: "For I know that my redeemer lives, and He shall stand at last on the earth; and after my skin is destroyed, this I know, that in my flesh I shall see God." 19:25,26 & 11 Cyril & Methodius Missionaries to the Slavs: Brothers; Greek nobility; priests. Evangelized Jewish Khazars in Russia in 861, Moravia, 1863; developed a Slavonic alphabet and translated the Bible into Cyrillic. Methodius also evangelized in Bohemia, Pannonia (Roman Hungary), former Yugoslavia, & into Poland. • 21 Emperor Constantine, Christian Ruler & Helena, mother of Constantine: Took a special interest in Jerusalem, destroyed by Romans, 70 AD. As Jesus prophesied, the Temple was desecrated & demolished, with only a portion of the Western (Wailing) Wall surviving. Matt 24:10 • It was Helena, on pilgrimage (journey for a religious purpose) to the Holy Land, 326-327, directed the building of churches on traditional sites identified with Jesus' life. • 24 Esther (her Persian name, means star): Orphaned Jewish girl named Hadassah; carried away to Babylon; raised by cousin Mordecai; used in God's plan to save Jews of Persia from annihilation. The Book of Esther comes after Ezra & Nehemiah; chronologically her 'story' is before / around Ezra's time. • Sent to the palace for the "I Need A New Queen Contest," after the previous queen, Vashti, ticked off the king. On her cousin's advice, she hid her nationality. Mordecai, on the other hand was openly Jewish & made an enemy at court when he refused to bow to Haman. Irate, Haman put out a "hit" on him, by hatching a plot to kill every Jew in Persia! • Mordecai gave Esther the bad news; told her it was time to act; after praying 3 days, took her life in her hands & went to see the king. Dangerous move, since without a royal invitation she might hear, 'Off with her head!' Long story short, Esther made a plan; exposed wicked Haman; revealed she was Jewish; & God's people were saved from a nasty end. "God" is not named, but He was at work: this is Judah's tribe, line of Christ! Gen. 49:10, Rev. 5:5 & 25 Bede the Venerable: The "most learned man of his day," his writings used dates reckoned from Christ's Incarnation (BC/AD). He died a few days before The Ascension Feast, 735.
