It's hard to believe that we are halfway through the school year already! We had a great attendance at the Pilgrim Meal, November 14th. The students provided artwork, crafts, and songs for the meal. We also packed ten Thanksgiving boxes and purchased twelve Woodies gift certificates for Grace Food Pantry. Thank you to all who contributed items, packed boxes, and provided the delicious food (PTL). We appreciate you!

The students are preparing for the Children's Christmas Program on December 20th, 7:00pm, and looking forward to Christmas Break. As we all prepare in this busy season, may we all pause to turn our focus to celebrating Christ's Birthday and our salvation through Him.

Becoming a Choice (voucher) school has helped with tuition for many of our families. We received the first scholarship payment from the state the end of October. Our next payments will come in March and the end of May. We also offer additional scholarships through the LSGO (Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization), a Church Partnership Scholarship for active membership in a student's home church, and a School Partnership Scholarship for those who volunteer within the school and PTL; as well as using the Tuition Assistance Fund as needed. Some of our families are able to receive full scholarship awards, making a Christian school education affordable.

Since we still use the LSGO to help cover remaining tuition costs for eligible families, we need to maintain funds in the SGO. Please continue to give, and remember you will receive a tax credit and deduction for your donations! You can find several (easy) ways to donate at www.lutheranSGO.org/Donate. Donations can be given through a check, IRA, stocks, Donor Advised Funds, PayPal, credit card, and NOW electronic giving! Benefits to you are a 50% state tax credit for your donation and eligibility for a tax deduction. These scholarships make a big difference for our families. If you desire to mail a check to the LSGO, pamphlets with mailing information are available in the tract rack. (Checks needs to be written to the Lutheran Scholarship Granting Organization.)

We also continue to take donations to St. Paul's tuition assistance fund. Checks for tuition assistance can be made out to the church.

TAX-PLANNING STRATEGIES

As we approach the end of the calendar year, there is still time to implement tax-planning

strategies that can help you minimize your tax burden in 2023 and/or longer term.

ROTH CONVERSIONS

The end of the year may be an optimal time to consider a Roth conversion because income and tax brackets can be easier to estimate. Roth conversions allow you to take a portion of your qualified pre-tax retirement account assets (traditional individual retirement accounts (IRAs), rollover IRAs, etc.) and convert them to a Roth IRA. The conversion creates taxable income for the year in which it occurs and cannot be undone. However, despite incurring this initial tax liability, Roth conversions can offer several long-term benefits.

- By decreasing the tax-deferred account balance on which your required minimum distributions (RMDs) are calculated, you reduce your RMDs and thereby reduce taxable income long term.
- Roth accounts act as a long-term hedge against increasing tax rates, whether those increases result from higher income or changes to tax law.
- Not only does reducing RMD income lower taxes long term, it also decreases
 Medicare premiums during RMD years.
- Assets that are converted to a Roth account grow tax free during and beyond your lifetime, creating a tax-efficient way to transfer wealth to beneficiaries.

obligation, you can make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)¹ directly to charitable organizations. QCDs allow charitable giving directly from an IRA to an eligible charity for up to \$100,000 per person per year. Starting in 2024, this amount will be indexed annually for inflation. The QCD lowers your taxable RMD, which lowers your adjusted gross income (AGI) dollar for dollar—meaning that you do not need to claim the itemized deduction to benefit from this charitable strategy.

UPDATE ON REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

Since the Revitalization Program was started, there has been quite a bit of activity involving the various boards, directors of boards and school staff. Some of these activities are as follows>

- * Completion of "Connect to Disciple" workshop by day and preschool school staff, directors of all church boards, Pastor Wonnacott and church and school secretaries. The focus on the workshop was recognizing opportunities in our church, school and communities to create disciples...the mission every Christian has been given by Christ.
- * Completion of "Shepherding the Strays" workshop by board of Lay Ministry and Pastor Wonnacott. The focus of this workshop was how to work with church members who have decreased their involvement in attending worship services, Bible studies and church activities in order to assist them in the spiritual walk with Christ.
- * Establishment of revised and Vision and Mission statements for St Paul's church and school. These statements are as follows:

VISION

From Strategic Planning Session 9/25/23:

"A Christian family of believers, led by the Holy Spirit, going out into the Bremen community and surrounding areas to make disciples of St. Paul's members and the unchurched."

MISSION

From Strategic Planning Session 9/25/23:

"Through God's saving grace St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church and School will equip its families to develop and grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ so that they may share his good news of salvation."

"Forgetfulness"

Bless the LORD, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits. Psalm 103:2

The Indians helped the pilgrims of Plymouth. You know that and I know that.

We also know the pilgrims and the Indians celebrated Thanksgiving together. But the people who work at Plymouth Plantation, a recreation of an English village and Native American home site, say some folks have forgotten that relationship.

One Native American commented, "People will say things that will hurt you."

What kind of things?

- Things like parents telling their children, "If you don't behave, I am going to leave you with this Indian squaw, and she will cook you for dinner."
- Things like a fellow who said, "I thought we killed all of you."
- Things like an adult chaperone who asked, "Where do you get your alcohol?"

People forget. Things happen. History happens, and people forget.

I wonder if the Lord doesn't oftentimes think His people are prone to a mental amnesia that causes us to forget His benevolence and kindness -- things that ought to bring continuous thanksgiving to our hearts.

The Lord gives us 70, 80, 90 years of good health, but we forget those years and accuse Him of not caring when we start to run down. He has blessed and taken care of our nation for many years, but when the economy is not as healthy as we think it ought be, all too often God is accused of having gone on vacation.

Maybe that's why the Psalmist reminds us to bless the Lord and keep remembering all the wonderful things He has done -- physical blessings, most certainly, spiritual blessings, most assuredly.

The Lord who sent His Son to live, die, and rise so we might be rescued from certain damnation wants us to remember and give thanks.

THE OPEN BIBLE: The Word of God which reveals to us the life-giving words and works of Jesus Christ.

DOVE: A symbol of the Holy Spirit who creates and sustains our faith in Jesus Christ as our Savior and Lord.



The Ten Commandments Signify the Law of God, which shows us our sin and need for a Savior.





TRINITY SYMBOLS: There are 4 different geometric figures used to represent the Three-In-One nature of our Triune God. The TRIANGLE is the distinct symbol of the Trinity, often combined with a TREFOIL (clover), TRIQUETRA (arcs) or intertwined CIRCLES; all representing the Unity, Eternity, and Equality of the Godhead. In addition, there is a '3 fish' Trinity symbol which signifies that though only Jesus died on the cross, all Three Persons of the Godhead are active in our salvation. The fish is also an early symbol for Jesus.

IHS and CROSS: IHS are the first letters from the Greek of the name Jesus. All crosses point to our Lord's atoning work of salvation. Symbol also appears as IHC / IHS in a circle. The circle symbol stands for God, without beginning or end.



CHI RHO w/ ALPHA & OMEGA: X (chi) P (rho) are the 2 letters of the Greek alphabet which form the Chr in English of the name Christ. Alpha and Omega are the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet. With XP, they signify Jesus is True God.

THE TAU CROSS (shape of a letter 'T.' From John 3:14,15 -- "And as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, even so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life."

CROSSES: All crosses point to Jesus' sacrificial death. Alone, it is an emblem of faith. The Latin Cross w/ its longer vertical arm is the most common style used in Western Christendom. Used with the Alpha and Omega it shows the personal union of our Lord -- True God and True Man.

STARS: Symbol of Divinity. 5-pt star: long visit of the Magi. W/ a rose: represents the rose/ True Man. 8-pt. "Jacob's" 'Star is a of Jacob; A scepter shall rise of Israel."
