TAX-PLANNING STRATEGIES

As we approach the end of the calendar year, there is still time to implement tax-planning strategies that can help you minimize your tax burden in 2023 and/or longer term.

ROTH CONVERSIONS

The end of the year may be an optimal time to consider a Roth conversion because income and tax brackets can be easier to estimate. Roth conversions allow you to take a portion of your qualified pre-tax retirement account assets (traditional individual retirement accounts (IRAs), rollover IRAs, etc.) and convert them to a Roth IRA. The conversion creates taxable income for the year in which it occurs and cannot be undone. However, despite incurring this initial tax liability, Roth conversions can offer several long-term benefits.

- By decreasing the tax-deferred account balance on which your required minimum distributions (RMDs) are calculated, you reduce your RMDs and thereby reduce taxable income long term.
- Roth accounts act as a long-term hedge against increasing tax rates, whether those increases result from higher income or changes to tax law.
- Not only does reducing RMD income lower taxes long term, it also decreases
 Medicare premiums during RMD years.
- Assets that are converted to a Roth account grow tax free during and beyond your lifetime, creating a tax-efficient way to transfer wealth to beneficiaries.

obligation, you can make Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)¹ directly to charitable organizations. QCDs allow charitable giving directly from an IRA to an eligible charity for up to \$100,000 per person per year. Starting in 2024, this amount will be indexed annually for inflation. The QCD lowers your taxable RMD, which lowers your adjusted gross income (AGI) dollar for dollar—meaning that you do not need to claim the itemized deduction to benefit from this charitable strategy.

Voters' Assembly Information – I have recently been asked about maintaining voting privilege at Voters' Assembly meetings. I'm sharing here a section of what the bylaws of St. Paul's say about Voting Membership. St. Paul's Constitution and Bylaws (Bylaws Article 2 Section 3)

Section 3. Forfeiture of Voting Membership

The Recording Secretary shall keep the voters informed of their voting status via the published minutes of the Voters' Assembly...

A member who is absent from Voters' Assembly for 12 consecutive months without having offered an excuse to the Recording Secretary or Executive Director shall forfeit his voting membership until reinstated in accordance with procedures in Section 1 of this Article.

If you are unsure of your voting status, please check the latest minutes of the Voters'

Assembly. The list of eligible voters is attached to the minutes. If there is a meeting scheduled and you know that you will be absent, please contact the recording secretary (Ken Eichinger) or Executive Director (Dave Burcham) to excuse yourself. The minutes are usually available in the narthex the Sunday after the meeting. If there are no copies available in the narthex, contact the recording secretary.

UPDATE ON REVITALIZATION PROGRAM

Since the Revitalization Program was started, there has been quite a bit of activity involving the various boards, directors of boards and school staff. Some of these activities are as follows>

- * Completion of "Connect to Disciple" workshop by day and preschool school staff, directors of all church boards, Pastor Wonnacott and church and school secretaries. The focus on the workshop was recognizing opportunities in our church, school and communities to create disciples...the mission every Christian has been given by Christ.
- * Completion of "Shepherding the Strays" workshop by board of Lay Ministry and Pastor Wonnacott. The focus of this workshop was how to work with church members who have decreased their involvement in attending worship services, Bible studies and church activities in order to assist them in the spiritual walk with Christ.
- * Establishment of revised and Vision and Mission statements for St Paul's church and school. These statements are as follows:

"A Christian family of believers, led by the Holy Spirit, going out into the Bremen community and surrounding areas to make disciples of St. Paul's members and the unchurched."

MISSION

From Strategic Planning Session 9/25/23:

"Through God's saving grace St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church and School will equip its families to develop and grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ so that they may share his good news of salvation."

* Establishment of Strategic Plan goals that will be completed by the boards of the congregation. These goals and which board is assigned for completion are as follows:

Indoctrinating Your Children by Peter Scaer

"I won't indoctrinate my children but will let them decide for themselves." Non-

believers boast that their children are free and critical thinkers, taught to be kind and non-judgmental. Remarkably, though, these free-thinking children end up just like their supposedly free-thinking parents. Those not "indoctrinated" with biblical values end up with other kinds of indoctrination, offered up by the schools, TikTok, and the like. Nature, after all, abhors a vacuum.

Yet Christians fall for this way of thinking, saying that they want schools that don't indoctrinate, but rather teach their kids the basics of reading, writing, and arithmetic. Okay, but what are they reading? Should it be "Billy Has Two Daddies"?

Or should it be dry training manuals, so that children will be taught to read, but have nothing that will feed their souls, minds, and imaginations? Raising children is always a value-laden

enterprise, as is education. For Chamber of Commerce Republicans, it's not about raising up a citizenry capable of keeping a constitutional republic, it's about training a workforce. For Democrats, it's about just about climate change, diversity, equity, and inclusion. That's their spirituality, and that's their dogma, which they wish to inculcate into your children. And yet parents say that they will let their children choose their own path. What they are really saying is that the world, with all its -isms, can better teach their children. Say what you will, but all education has content and purpose. Classical education recognizes that we do well to draw from deeper wells. If we wish to ensure the blessings of liberty, educational content matters, and that includes not only our founding fathers, but the material that motivated them, with proper due give to the democracy of Athens and the Republic of Rome. If we wish poetic souls, you can't do without a thorough grounding in Shakespeare. No person can rightly be called knowledgeable without a thorough knowledge of the Bible.

If you skip church, you are teaching your children that God doesn't matter. If you know Christ is the Great Physician, and don't take your children to Him, you practice the worst kind of negligence. The secularists can at least pat themselves on the back for raising "free thinking" children who think just like they do. Christians who hand their kids off to the media and the school system will find that their own children will be just as "free-thinking" as those of their agnostic neighbor.

Fear.

Read the paper and you will be forced to confess: it's hard to beat back feelings of fear. Maybe that's why so many people aren't reading the paper any longer.

In recent years, fears have taken on a global, national, and neighborhood scale. Indeed, there doesn't seem to be any way we can escape fear. That's true for the common person, as well as the individual who has managed to make it to the top of the human heap.

Would you mind an example? I hope not.

Although he was one of the most powerful men in the world, Joseph Stalin, dictator of Russia, lived in constant fear of being poisoned or murdered. He had eight bedrooms -- bedrooms in which he could lock himself up -- bedrooms where he was as safe as if he had been in a bank vault.

Why eight bedrooms? He wanted to make sure nobody ever knew in which of those bedrooms he would sleep on any given night.

As I've gone around the country I've noticed most of our Daily Devotion readers don't have the kind of house that allows them to escape their fears by moving around from bedroom to bedroom.

True, some of us have equipped our homes with burglar alarms; some carry guns or mace, and most of us try to stay out of neighborhoods where we know we won't be welcomed. Still, after all our excellent precautions have been made, we are forced to admit: fear remains.

This is just one of the reasons we need a Savior. Of course, knowing Jesus does not mean everything becomes sweetness and light. It doesn't mean there is no cause to be afraid.

On the other hand, if Jesus is your Savior; if He remains Your constant Companion, you are assured that none of the evil in this world will have the final word, or keep

the upper hand.

Remember, Jesus is the one who conquered sin, Satan, and death. His victory assures us this world simply does not have a match for our divine Protector.

And that, dear readers, is the special source of comfort we all need in this world of fear.

Charitable Gifting

(Note: This information was extracted from a recent newsletter from Thrivent. It is being presented for informational purposes only).

What constitutes a gift to charity?

A gift to charity is simply a gratuitous transfer of property to a charitable organization. There are several different types of property that can be donated to charity.

How do you decide whether to donate to charity?

The decision to donate to charity is a personal one. The IRS does not require that you have any charitable motivation when you donate to charity. You can do it strictly for the tax benefits.

What are the tax benefits of donating to charity?

Most every charity depends on individual contributions to remain financially solvent. As a result, charitable giving has become interconnected with the tax laws. Congress has set up rules taxpayers who donate to qualified charities need to follow. First, you generally receive an income tax deduction in the year you make the gift. Second, you do not have to worry about gift tax. Third, charitable gifts serve to reduce your taxable estate.

What options do you have for donating to charity?

An outright gift

Split interest gift in trust

CRAT (charitable remainder annuity trust)

CRUT (charitable remainder unitrust)

Pooled income fund

Charitable lead trust

Bargain sale

Private foundation

Community foundation

Donor-advised fund

As you can see, charitable donations are every complicated and require the use of a financial advisor, tax lawyer or your insurance representative.

The Twelve Days of Christmas, December 25 - January 5, followed by Epiphany Day. to protect its young represents Jesus, who died to save us from our sins. $+ 2^{m}$ two turtledoves: represent the Old and New Testaments Available to all is the complete Scriptural account of God's plan of salvation. $+3^{rd}$, three French hens: represent faith, hope, and love. I Corinthians 13 + 4th, four calling birds: signify the 4 Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, John. +5th, five golden rings: first 5 books of the Bible, the Pentateuch. $+6^{th}$, six geese a laying: from Genesis, each egg laid represents a day of creation, when it was formed ('hatched') by God. + 7th, seven swans a swimming: birds represent the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit - prophecy, ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, leading, compassion. +8th, eight maids-a-milking: from the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus came to save and bless us all, even the lowliest among us. At this point in time, being a milk maid was one of the worst jobs one could have. Believers blessed by Christ's coming include: the poor in spirit, the meek, those who mourn, the merciful, those who hunger for righteousness, the pure in heart, peacemakers, and those persecuted for the faith. $+9^{th}$, nine ladies dancing: the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, longsuffering (patience), goodness (generosity), kindness, gentleness, faithfulness, self-control. Galatians 522,23a + 10th ten lords-a-leaping: the Ten Commandments. English 'lords' were often judges, charged with upholding the law. $+11^{th}$ eleven pipers piping: How many apostles did Jesus have?

with upholding the law. $+11^{th}$, eleven pipers piping: How many apostles did Jesus have? Twelve; but only eleven were faithful – Judas Iscariot was lost; so eleven of the original Twelve went out into the world; preaching about our Lord, planting churches and training pastors; until all but John met a martyrs death. The apostles are remembered through days on the Church Calendar. $+12^{th}$, twelve drummers drumming:

refers to 12 points of doctrine taught by the Church, as found in the Apostles Creed: The Trinity (Father, Son, Holy Spirit); 6-day Creation; The Incarnation of Jesus (only begotten, made man); The virgin Birth; The Humiliation of Christ (suffered, crucified, died, buried); The Exaltation of Christ: (resurrection & ascension); The Second Coming; The Judgment of the living and dead; The Church (apostolic, true, invisible & the communion of saints - all believers in Jesus living and dead); The Forgiveness of sins; The Resurrection of the body; The Life Everlasting (heaven).
