"Before You, Lord, We Bow"

"Before You, Lord, we bow, Our God who reigns above, And rules the world below, Boundless in pow'r and love. Our thanks we bring, In joy and praise, Our hearts we raise to You, our King!

"Earth, hear your Maker's voice; Your great Redeemer own; Believe, obey, rejoice, And worship Him alone. Cast down your pride, Your sin deplore, And bow before the Crucified."

The author of our hymn is Sir Francis Scott Key, who wrote the familiar lyrics that became America's national anthem. But today's hymn is not about loyalty to an earthly nation. Our hymn is a song of allegiance to the Lord of *all* nations. "Our God who reigns above" is the King of kings, who "makes nations great, and He destroys them; He enlarges nations, and leads them away" (Job 12:23).

The nations of the earth have their own rulers, and their approach to government takes many forms. Most often the rule is carried out for the good of those whom they govern. Although in some places the ruler may serve evil and selfish ends. Some rulers are monarchs who inherit the throne; others are dictators who take power for themselves by military might, and many are leaders elected by the people they govern. We as Christians are called to honor and obey our rulers, so long as their rule does not lead us in ways that are contrary to God's commands.

Earth's rulers may take up their power in many ways, but the Lord before whom we bow came into His kingly power by allowing His subjects to crown Him with thorns and

nail Him to a cross, where He suffered and died for the sins of the world. Jesus our Lord was buried and raised to life on the third day and exalted to reign in glory at the right hand of God. Earthly kings, when faced with rebellious subjects, will often deal harshly with them. Our King came to earth to lay down His life to save us, rebels who rejected His lordship. By the power of the Holy Spirit at work in the Word, we are called to repentance, our sins are forgiven, and we are welcomed into His kingdom.

Our hymn calls on the earth to hear its Maker's voice, a voice heard as "the heavens declare the glory of God" (Psalm 19:1a). But only in God's Word will the earth hear of the Maker's love for the world He created. Jesus, our crucified and risen King, said that repentance and forgiveness were to be proclaimed in His Name to all nations (see Luke 24:47). Through our witness we call on the nations to cast down their pride and deplore their sin. We pray that one day they will acknowledge Jesus as Lord.

The final verse of this hymn is a prayer that, on the Last Day, our native land might send forth from its tombs "a glorious band" to offer eternal praise to heaven's high King. We pray that the Holy Spirit would work through our witness and by the power of the Gospel turn rebels into saints who will joyfully "bow before the Crucified."

MISSIONS & MUSIC: *"Go, make disciples of all nations!"* Pope Gregory I, a.k.a. the Great, 590 – 604, is credited with organizing the liturgy of the church, codifying its music (Gregorian chant, or plainsong), and establishing monasteries throughout the declining Roman Empire.

He ordered the monks not to retreat from society, but preach the Gospel, with the goal of converting invading barbarians. ~ They continued the work of St. Martin-of-Tours (Luther is named after him), who preached in Gaul (France) around 371. ~ St. Patrick, said to have "converted" the Irish c. 432 \sim Clovis of the Franks (a Germanic tribe) converted in 496, then told his subjects if they didn't go to the river the next day and be baptized they'd incur his wrath. \sim The Irish abbot Columba worked from the island of Iona (off Scotland), as a base to preach in Scotland and England. ~ St. Augustine baptized King Ethelbert of Kent (England) at Canterbury, in 597. ~ Willibrord worked mainly among the Frisians (present-day Holland) for forty years. In 717, he preached in Denmark, the first attempt to reach the Scandinavians; Anskar followed in the 830's. Swedish king Bjorn allowed him to build a church. Olaf I, of Norway, converted while being educated in England. Upon his return, *he* preached the Gospel; and in 1016, Norway "became Christian" when he became king (he ordered his subjects to convert). Christianity took a permanent hold a century later. ~ Also in 717, St. Boniface began preaching to the Germans. At Geismar in Hesse (western Germany), he cut down an oak tree the populace worshiped as Thor's sanctuary. When nothing happened, they were convinced his God was stronger. One of the monasteries he founded is still today a center for Catholic Christians. He met a violent death in 754, while visiting present-day Netherlands. \sim In the 750's, Pepin the Short, king of the Franks (Germans), saved the city of Rome from invasion by the Lombards (a barbarian people). His son, Charles the Great a.k.a. Charlemagne, became one of the most influential figures in church history. He desired that all Christians use the same language, so at his request in 781, the Pope provided him with the *Sacramentary*, a book containing texts of all of the liturgical prayers, including the Eucharist. He then ordered all rites to be conducted in Latin throughout his lands - most of western Europe. On Christmas Day, 800, he was crowned, by Pope Leo III, as the first emperor of the Holy Roman Empire (his Germanic lands). He ordered all monasteries and bishops homes to become centers for learning and study. Monks began transcribing both sacred writings and pagan works. They were copied in Latin, since by now Greek was not commonly understood. By 814, when Charlemagne died, medieval Europe had a thoroughly Christian culture. ~ Under Olaf Tryggvesson (969-1000), Icelanders democratically decided to become Christian. Eric the Red's Greenland colony received its first priest thanks to his son, Leif (Ericsson). \sim Hundreds of priests and friars came to North America (mostly the Caribbean) shortly after

1492, where they felt it was their task to preach the Gospel to the people of the New World and win them to Christ. ~ *"And lo, I am with you always."*

MUSIC The Harp is the symbol for sacred music. "*Rejoice in the Lord, O you righteous! For* praise from the upright is beautiful. Praise the Lord with the harp; Make melody to Him with an instrument of ten strings. Sing to Him a new song; Play skillfully with a shout of joy." Psalms $33:1-3 \sim$ Trumpet: name is from the sound made by a Ram's Horn, mentioned many times throughout Scripture. God used its sound to call Israel to Sinai. Exodus 19:16-17 ~ He instituted an annual Feast of Trumpets for Israel to observe. Lev. 23:24 ~ Its will sound at Jesus' Second Coming. "For the Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of an archangel, and with the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first." 1 Thess. 4:16 \sim David, accomplished harp player, I Sam. 16:16-21, specifically appointed three men to oversee the service of song in the Lord's house. I Chr. 6:33,39,44 \sim Prophets were known to use instruments: "a group of prophets coming down from the high place with a stringed instrument, a tambourine, a flute, and a harp before them." 1 Samuel 10:5 ~ Elisha called for a *musician before* he prophesied Israel's deliverance from Moab. II Kings 3:15 ~ Scripture also mentions the lute Ps. 57:8; cymbals Ps. 150:5; lyre Dan. 3:5; timbrels and pipes Ezek. 28:13; and <u>bells</u> (part of the priest's robe). Ex. 33-35 ~ <u>Church bells</u>: Celtic bishops (Ireland) rang small hand bells to summon the faithful to worship. Larger ones were used by monasteries to call monks and nuns at the hours of prayer. From the 6th century onward, the use of bells spread throughout Europe, as many were installed in towers beside the church. Used not only to call the people to prayer, but alert them to the dangers of impending invasion, fire, flood, and disasters. They even rang during thunder-storms because it was believed to avert lightning! ~ Today, the use of the church bell is still to call the faithful to worship; and in general, means the proclamation of the Gospel.

"Praise the LORD! Praise God in His sanctuary; Praise Him in His mighty firmament! Praise Him for His mighty acts; Praise Him according to His excellent greatness! Let everything that has breath praise the LORD. Praise the LORD!" Psalm 150:1-2,6
